Status of Charity and Governing Document

The Bridge Community Project is established by Constitution. The legal form of the Charity is a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation) and it is a registered Scottish Charity (No. SC045049).

Aims and affiliation

The Bridge Community Project seeks to improve the everyday wellbeing of the people of West Lothian. We achieve this through providing practical and relational support to families and individuals.

Experience has taught us that reflecting on a year in the life of The Bridge Community Project (no doubt like many other wellbeing focused projects) is always a moment for both concern and gratitude.

Concern stems from the recognition that people in West Lothian are still living with the financial and emotional consequences of both a pandemic and a cost of living crisis and, as a consequence their everyday wellbeing continues to be severely impacted. There is also concern that our ability to respond as quickly and as fully as we would like is limited by the growing numbers of those seeking our help and the limited resources that we have available.

It is therefore deeply gratifying that people who reach out to The Bridge in difficult times continue to tell us that they are professionally and compassionately helped by our team of staff and volunteers. As a result, these teams deserve enormous credit for the way they continue to adapt to the significant challenges they face in delivering our services in an increasingly challenging climate.

In addition, we continue to seek at every opportunity to develop collaborative working with other groups and organisations in West Lothian in seeking to meet our aims. Finally, thanks are due to everyone who plays their part in the life of The Bridge. All these contributions make a practical difference in the lives of so many.

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Operational Impact Report, Alan Davidson CEO

The daily operations at the Bridge have evolved into a crucial element of the support network for individuals in West Lothian grappling with emotional or financial challenges. Amid a challenging year, our services have played a vital role in enhancing overall well-being. The enduring effects of the COVID pandemic have manifested in a notable surge in individuals seeking mental health assistance, coupled with a growing cost-of-living crisis that has exacerbated poverty. Throughout, our teams have maintained a person-centered approach, offering a sense of hope for the future.

A highlight of the year was the transformation of our Wellbeing Hub in Livingston. The complete renovation of the ground floor not only enhances our service delivery but also introduces a new revenue stream for the charity. The revamped space now features five client rooms, an expanded training room, and improved kitchen facilities. Additionally, we've incorporated sustainable elements such as a new air source heat pump, a 20kWh solar and battery system, increased insulation, and energy-efficient LED lights throughout the building.

I express my gratitude to all supporters, funders, staff, and volunteers whose contributions enrich the Bridge's impact on the community.

Our Impact



WELLBEING HUB

One of the largest projects to take place in the life of the Bridge started on site January 2023 as we undertook a refurbishment of our ground floor at our Wellbeing Hub. Given the demand for our work in the community we wanted to ensure that we had the facilities in which to offer our wellbeing services as well as supporting other organisations who do similar work.

The refurbishment ensured that we now have the following:



5, 1 to 1 client rooms



Training room



High quality kitchen facilities



Air source heat pump, 20kwh solar & battery system, insulation and LED lighting













Our Financial Wellbeing team have been able to support **90** individuals in a person centred way to improve their financial Wellbeing. We worked predominately with those who live in **rural areas** and those who present with **mental health** conditions.




Our Counselling team have been able to support **88** individuals to improve their emotional wellbeing while offering **861** counselling sessions. Our service provides affordable mental health support in a safe environment.

The most common presenting issues are

TRAUMA ANXIETY DEPRESSION BEREAVEMENT SUICIDAL IDEATION

We used the Warwick Edinburgh Evaluation tool to measure a clients response before and after counselling. The results give a clear visual representation of the impact made.



92% of clients indicated an increase in their aility to cope more emotionally

78% of clients indicated an increase in being able to understand their own life circumstances

78% of clients indicated an increase in their resilience

74% of clients indicated an increase in their self esteem

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I am better at self-care, less inclined to 'rescue' people, tried new things, and basically saved myself from falling apart during major 'life events' that happened simultaneously. By talking it out instead of bottling up my emotions, has helped.

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I was experiencing burnout, through managing so many different life stressors such as an intense career, unhealthy relationships and people I care for. I was scared that I was going to lose everything I had worked so hard for, or not reach my long-term goals. Through counselling, I recognised how difficult my situation was, and started to bring about necessary changes to alleviate some stress. Now, I feel motivated, have a long-term vision back, believe in myself again, and feel I can manage my situation better. I'm excited about what the future holds for me, and I appreciate how the counsellor helped me through this difficult period in my life.





Our Stepping Stones to Wellbeing team have been able to support **151** individuals to improve their financial and emotional wellbeing through offering **23** groups and courses across the past year.



During this year, we have also been developing additional areas of our service and this has been participant led. We are currently in the process of launching the following:



A new course called **Anxiety Matters.** A three week course focused on exploring anxiety and how it can affect thoughts, feelings and behaviours.



A participant led monthly drop-in for all previous and current course participants called **Stepping Stones Connections.**



I had never attended a group course before and was a bit apprehensive about joining. Our group seemed to connect quite easily and by the second session I felt comfortable enough to share my story. Sarah was excellent at drawing out thoughts and expanding on them. The course has been a very positive experience for me and I'll continue to monitor the 'ingredients' in my jars. Thank you



The course has given me the confidence to continue to look for help and support to improve my mental health and not to be afraid to be open with my own challenges

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STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS



Over the past year we have been able to increase our staff and volunteer teams across services thanks to some additional funding.

Our volunteers gave an incredible **3,700** hours of time to our work in the past year, supporting clients across our 3 services.

We also said goodbye to some staff members:

Lesley, our Financial Wellbeing Manager, moved onto a new role after being with us for 6 years. Lesley has been key in developing the Financial Wellbeing service and we will miss her greatly.

Carole and Yvonne were employed on a one year contract to support the growth of our counselling service. We thank both for all their work and we are delighted that both have decided to stay on in a voluntary capacity.

PARTNERSHIPS



In early 2020 mental health focussed Third Sector organisations gathered to proactively ensure that access to their services was achievable through a single point of entry for clients.

This led to the creation of West Lothian Wellbeing and in 2022 the service found a new home at the Bridge Community Project where it will be managed on behalf of the 20 other organisations.

During the year the project supported over 100 people.

SOCIAL ENTERPRISE

As the Bridge looks to its future, we are seeking to diversify our income streams. This began last year with the creation of Counselling West Lothian, a community of trusted counsellors who are based in West Lothian and who are vetted by us.



Over the past year the number of counsellors signed up has grown to **9**. We hope to grow this number further as we settle into our refurbished Wellbeing Hub.

Moving into our new financial year we will be starting to increase the usage of the Wellbeing Hub, developing a business plan for delivering Employee Assistance work and exploring options around delivering training locally.

Funding

With thanks to all of our funders who have supported our work over the past year. A full list can be found in the accounts.

And also to our Bridge Builders, individuals who give to our work on a monthly basis, without which we would not be able to offer the services that we do.

Contribution of volunteers

A valuable contribution is made by volunteers who assist the Trustees in the delivery of activities. Volunteers are a key part of our operations who support across the work of the Bridge Community Project. Volunteer roles are varied and include money advisors, support advisers, counsellors, Admin support and wellbeing practitioners. Without the ongoing support of volunteers the Bridge would not be in the position it is today.

Financial review

Principal sources of funding

Our main source of funding has been from grants. We have also seen an increase in individuals giving to our work through our Bridge Builder program and through renting rooms at our Wellbeing Hub.

Results for the year

The financial statements for the year are set out in pages 11 to 23. The Statement of Financial Activity on page 11 reflects a surplus of £166,893 (2022: £21,746).

Reserves

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately three months unrestricted expenditure that allows sufficient funds to enable the ongoing work of the charity to be maintained. The General Fund on page 20 at 31 August 2023 amounted to £34,861 (2022: £37,921), which is currently below the required level. The Trustees are working on ways to increase reserve levels. Restricted reserves amounted to £124,773 (2022: £101,592), designated reserves amounted to £168,822 (2022: £22,050) which relates to the net book value of fixed assets less loans due relating to those assets. The charity's total reserves amounted to £328,456 (2022: £161,563).

Funds in deficit will be covered by future grant income that has not yet been received.

Remuneration

The charity sets remuneration for key management personnel by reference to external benchmarking.

Plans for the future

With the current cost of living crisis making a significant impact on people across our communities and the organisation, our focus over the coming year is to increase the capacity of our services and to explore and implement new income streams.

Report of the Independent Examiner to the Trustees for the year ended 31 August 2023

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 August 2023 which are set out on pages 11 to 23.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 August 2023

1. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation and assessment of going concern

The Bridge Community Project is a registered charity in Scotland. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 1 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are included in the trustees' report on pages 1-9.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

The Charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS102 Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure by the terms on which Trustees solicited donations or by restrictions imposed by the donor.

Income recognition

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

Income from government and other grants are recognised at fair value when the charity has entitlement after any performance conditions have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. If entitlement is not met then these amounts are deferred.

For donations to be recognised the charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled

Income from trading activities includes income earned from fundraising events and trading activities to raise funds for the charity. Income is received in exchange for supplying goods and services in order to raise funds and is recognised when entitlement has occurred.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 August 2023

Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. It is categorised under the following headings:

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them; and
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into the categories above.

Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognized as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of the economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. No amount is included in the financial statements for volunteer time in line with the SORP. Further detail is given in the Trustees' Annual Report.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are capitalised at cost where the value is greater than £500 less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. For property assets, an impairment review is performed each year. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the costs, less estimated residual value, of each asset on a systematic basis over its expected useful life as follows:

Office equipment 20% per annum straight line

Property improvements 5%, 10% and 20% per annum straight line

Freehold Property 2% per annum straight line

Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

Pensions

Employees of the charity are entitled to join a defined contribution pension scheme. The charity's contribution is restricted to the contributions disclosed in note 6. The costs of the defined contribution scheme are included within charitable expenditure.

2. Judgements in applying policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to make estimates and assumptions which affect reported income, expenses, assets, and liabilities. Use of available information and application of judgement are inherent in the formation of estimates, together with past experience and expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results in the future could differ from such estimates.

The Trustees are satisfied that the accounting policies are appropriate and applied consistently. Key sources of estimation have been applied in determining the depreciation rates which have been deemed to be appropriate for the class of asset.

3. Related Party Transactions and Trustees' Expenses and Remuneration

There were no transactions with the Trustees, and no remuneration nor expenses were paid to the Trustees, during the year ending 31 August 2023 (2022: nil).

There were no transactions with the related parties during the year ending 31 August 2023 (2022: nil).

Key management personnel are considered to be the Trustees and the senior management team, as noted on page 1. Key management personnel received remuneration of £74,044 during the period (2022: £68,645) which includes pension contributions of £1,282 (2022: £1,162).
